Farletonview is a day ticket fishery -

Fishery Rules

Season - Farletonview fishery is open throughout 12 months of the year, seven days a week - **Except** for approx. 3 weeks over Christmas and New Year - The fishery is closed from 20th December - 8th January inclusive.

Opening Hours - Access to the site is from 8am until sunset or 10pm whichever is earlier. It is the responsibility of anglers to establish the time of sunset on the day, should they plan to stay late.

All anglers must be familiar with the WADAA General Rules and Code of Conduct. See general rules.

Fly fishing only is allowed on the fishery, using conventional fly rod, fly reel and fly line. The use of bubble floats is forbidden.

Only barbless or de-barbed hooks are to be used when fly fishing.

You must **not** use landing nets with knotted mesh (National byelaw).

Please find below the rules for individual anglers, regarding fish that they may kill and be taken. This covers a calendar week, combining all waters:

Rainbow Trout: ONLY 2lb class fish are allowed to be killed - (those stocked between 1.75lbs and 2.5lbs) A maximum of 2 fish to be taken per session and up to a maximum of 4 fish per week.

NO other sized rainbow trout can be killed and must returned safely to the water as quickly as possible. Care needs to be taken with the unhooking of all trout, please try to keep the fish in the water where possible.

Brown Trout, Tiger Trout and Spartic Trout - ALL fish to be returned safely to the water as quickly as possible, without causing damage to the fish.

The sharing of fish by anglers to enhance a bag limit is forbidden.

The sale, or offer for sale, of any fish caught on WADAA's trout fisheries is forbidden.

Catch and release fishing is permitted.

Ground baiting, or any kind of loose feeding to attract fish is forbidden.

Fly rods rod must be held whenever a fly is in the water. When fishing sunken line tactics the fly must be continuously retrieved.

Wading is prohibited. Entry to the water is only allowed up to ankle height for the purpose of unhooking and releasing fish.
